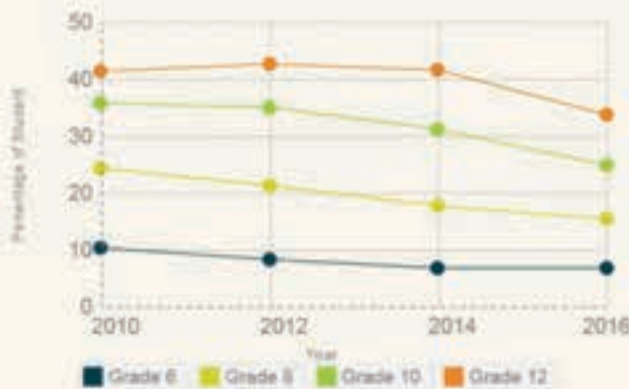

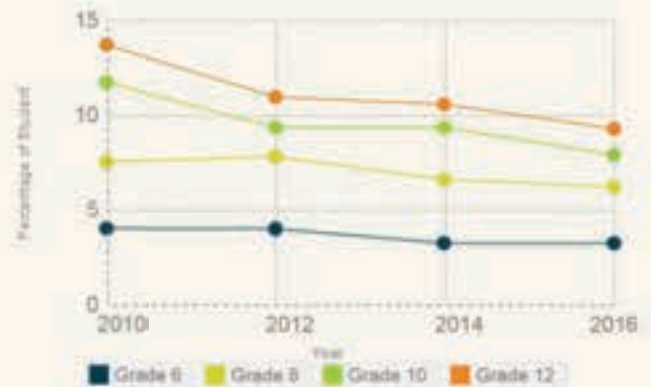
Non-Medical Use of Rx Drug

Underage Drinking and Non-Medical Use of Rx Drug Reduction!!

Alcohol Consumption in the Past 30 Days among Native Youth in 4 Tribal Jurisdiction Areas, by Year and Grade, 2010-2016 (n = 26,380)



Non-Medical Use of Rx Drug in the Past 30 Days among Native Youth in 4 Tribal Jurisdiction Areas, by Year and Grade, 2010-2016 (n = 26,380)



Majority of our tribal prevention programs began their implementation in 2015. Oklahoma Prevention Needs Assessment student survey (above) showed the biggest reduction of recent alcohol use among Native youth between the year of 2014 and the year of 2016

From 2010 to 2016, the percentage of students who used prescription drugs without a doctor's prescription had the greatest reduction among High School students (grade 10th and 12th in the graph above). Slight reduction can be seen in Middle School students (grade 6th and grade 8th)

Selected Short Term Improvements

- Pre- and Post-Notebook Survey showed an increased in knowledge of substance abuse
- Culture classes are very popular and a good vehicle for prevention messages
- A large percentage of Cultural Class participants became aware of the risks of Tribal substance use
- Reality Party Surveys showed parents increased knowledge of Social Host Law and the need of communication between parents and children
- Two of the four Tribal Governments have supplemented prevention funding
